# New Year's Award for West Bergholt Resident

A West Bergholt woman has been recognised in the New Year's Honours awards for her services to Higher Education.

Deanna Walker has been awarded the BEM (British Empire Medal) for her work at the University of Essex where she is administrator in the Registry Department. She joined the university staff 25 years ago in the Admissions Department working in several administrative roles before reaching her present position as Senior Academic Officer. Her work has included mentoring junior colleagues which, she believes, also contributed to colleagues recommending her for the award.

Her personal quest to record a local community led Deanna to make a significant contribution to social history. Her studies of the Basildon plotlands, where people lived on rural land and where she spent family holidays, led her to write a book on the subject. She and fellow writer Peter Jackson recorded memories of the disappearing community in another book. Deanna has shared her knowledge through giving talks and at day schools.

Even so Deanna is modest about her achievements. She says, "The award came out of the blue. When the letter came notifying me, I couldn't understand why I was chosen as I just do an ordinary working job."

It is work she loves and she has other reasons for considering the University of Essex a special place. It is where she studied for her History degree and where she met her husband, Paul, a fellow student. A keen writer, she takes advantage of the writers' workshops held at the University and she also enjoys studying at the WEA courses held in the village.

Her writing covers her wide range of interests ranging from J.B. Priestley to science fiction. She has combined her interest in science fiction with her writing skills to pitch story ideas to the producers of Star Trek. Her latest work, a radio play, In the 'Shadow of the Bulldozer', has been podcast as part of the Essex Book Festival and she is now working on children's stories.

Deanna and her husband Paul, a tutor, say of the village, "We have lived here for seventeen years and love it here."

She will be presented with her award at a ceremony at Ingatestone Hall and is also looking forward to the garden party at Buckingham Palace to celebrate her achievement.

# West Bergholt Concert Band



The Band brought 2013 to a sparkling end at the West Cliff Theatre, with our Christmas Concert described by one audience member as "the most enjoyable Christmas Concert I've been to in many, many years". As well as being a hugely enjoyable event, the packed house helped us raise over £1500 for St Helena Hospice, meaning we raised more for charities in our 35th anniversary year than in any other, and leaving us within a few pounds of having raised \$30,000 in recent years. Prior to the Christmas Concert our November "Band Play Day" and Concert at St Botolph's raised over £500 for CLIC Sargent, the Cancer charity for young people, and saw the band present a stunning performance of music ranging from 'Peter and the Wolf' to 'One Direction'...the very definition of eclectic !

The start of 2014 sees us embarking on a major recruiting drive to replace the swathe of players who will be leaving for University in September. This year sees a double-whammy of a particularly high number of leavers combined with those leavers being some of our best players, so we will be doing everything we can to replace them. We've already held one of our popular Open Rehearsals as well as a Training Band schools rehearsal & mini-concert, and have another scheduled for March 29th at Millfields, Wivenhoe. As ever the band is very welcoming of new players, so if vou did happen to receive a Brass or Woodwind instrument for Christmas...you know where we are. The band has always been a friendly bunch, we don't audition new members, and the band's uniqueness is that we have players from 7 to 70, so there's always someone vounger/older/worse/better than vou. If not, you could help us spread the word about the band by letting schools and music teachers know about us...we will be very appreciative for you doing so.

Our concerts for the year start at the West Cliff Theatre, with "Broadway to the Big Bands" featuring music from Artie Shaw, Dave Brubeck, Sousa, Henry Mancini...and many more.

Sally Hepher's talk illustrated the value of the Woodland Trust in creating new woodland, restoring old woods and in particular protecting ancient woodlands from the pressure of todays road, rail and housing developments. It was becoming increasingly important to retain woodland to save endangered species and their habitats for future generations. The talk was well appreciated by the Members and it is more than likely that she will be asked to return to give a further talk on one of her varied interests.

Barry Kaufmann-Wright described the ongoing work aimed to protect our wildlife population from both man and machine. He talked of the protective works which had been carried out to save several species. He referred in particular to his knowledge of both newts and badgers, the former still threatened by new developments and the latter from man and illegal baiting. In all an interesting as well as an educative talk.

# Garage and shed security

Quite often the supplied locks provide just the barest minimum security and are easily overcome so always consider supplementing the existing locks with further locking systems both for the doors and items within.

On **garage** doors this could be by adding locking bolts to both sides of the "up and over door" or a garage door defender in the ground in front of the door. With **sheds** coach-bolt and plate the padlock hasp sections to the frame and door, use a good quality "Close Shackle" padlock; don't forget the hinges - ensure they cannot be unscrewed.

Consider using "Ground Anchors" or "Shed Shackles" to chain larger items to (again good quality padlock and chain); keep chain tight so that it is not in contact with a surface it can be struck against. Protect windows with a wire mesh and fit a curtain or white wash the windows to prevent prying eyes.

Visibly security mark your property with your post code and house number this reduces the value to the thief; you can even register serial numbers free of charge at www.immobilise.com

It is also worth fitting a shed alarm to the shed or garage, and adding security lighting. These are relatively inexpensive and available from most DIY/hardware stores.

If siting a new shed, where possible, position it within sight of rooms in the house routinely occupied.

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# **Allotment News**

Another new season is upon us with once again weather conditions being the key to the endeavours of plot holders during 2014. You would be forgiven if you thought that ever since the hosepipe ban in 2012 it has not stopped raining, particularly these last few months during the winter period, which has really been challenging for those on the allotments.

Looking back on 2013 the allotments continue to provide a central recreational function for the green fingered residents in West Bergolt with the number of plots being made available increasing to 141. This creditable increase has been achieved with the introduction of starter plots (2.5 rods) and 5 rod plots. In addition, during the year, a successful bid by the allotment committee secured a grant from the Essex County Council's Editable Essex funds for the purchase of a powerful rotovator to be available for members in future times. Amongst other things the award recognised how the profile of allotment users had changed in recent times with a significant increase in numbers of female/family participants and more senior citizens.

The 2013 growing season yielded good success for all, in particular, soft fruit such as strawberries, raspberries and blackcurrants. Conditions were equally favourable for various salad produce along with the traditional vegetables of broad beans, potatoes, carrots, summer greens, corn on the cob along with the winter crops of leek, parsnip, swede cauliflower and Brussels sprouts. One thing all plot holders appreciate, in addition to the reward and taste of growing one's own fruit and vegetables, is the savings achieved to the weekly household budget.

The allotment committee continues to ensure that the allotments cater for the novice as well as the seasoned grower. If you are a resident in the community and interested in acquiring an allotment plot simply contact the Clerk for West Bergholt Parish Council, Val Walsom.
