West Bergholt's future for the next 30 years is being shaped and developed using a National planning scheme known as the Neighbourhood Plan. For the first time in our history the people of West Bergholt have the opportunity to shape our village future in terms of what is most important to us as residents and includes

- New homes acceptable numbers and preferred locations.
- Sport and recreational facilities that meet future needs and where these should be located.
- Village hall enhancements that meet future needs and are environmentally sustainable.
- Ensuring our pre-school and primary school are not constrained by space. Provide the right environment to develop our future generations.
- Children's play area enhancements to match the best in Essex .
- Improved footways, cycle ways and traffic safety plans that reflect a vibrant and an interesting place to live.
- Business enhancements shaping the development of our existing business parks to reflect job creation, local needs and sustainability.

All these points and more must form part of our Neighbourhood Plan before it can be accepted as the model for our village future. This is our opportunity to state what we want to avoid our village future being determined by housing developers and/or external government bodies.

2015 will see the completion of the Neighbourhood Plan prior to it being subject to a village wide referendum before it can be adopted.

The plan outline findings and the vision for the future compiled from surveys and questionnaires will be on display and discussed on

Please Keep West Bergholt Clean and Tidy

The Parish Council recently received complaints from some residents regarding dog fouling. We have a village Handyman who helps to clear up litter but he does not deal with dog poo. It is only the irresponsible dog owners who do not clean up after their dog.

It is important when walking with your dog along roads and pavements that you keep your dog on a lead. Dogs are not allowed on the Lorkin Daniell Field but are allowed on the Heath and on Poors Land. Your dog must be kept under control and remember these areas are where children are playing. Use a plastic bag to pick up any dog pooh and place in any of the many dog bins in the village. Please help to keep the village clean.

Parish Council Awarded Quality Status

West Bergholt has been awarded "Quality Status" as part of the national local council award scheme launched in November 2014. Only ten other councils nationally have so far been awarded quality status under the new scheme introduced by the National Association of Local Councils (NALC).

The local council award scheme itself has been designed to celebrate the successes of the very best local councils, and to provide a framework for local councils to improve and develop to meet their full potential. In line with modern practice all submissions to the awarding panel are Internet based.

Commenting on the West Bergholt application the judging panel said:

"The Panel agreed this was a good application and the Council had provided excellent information through its web site. The web site was well organised and easy to navigate. The Village Bulletin was also excellent giving up to date information."

The Quality Standard has three levels of accreditation, including a 'Gold' level, which West Bergholt are not qualified to participated in until after Parish Council elections in May.

In response to the award being made, Chairman John Gili-Ross said:

"Achieving the foundation level is very satisfying from a Councillor's perspective but our community deserves a "Gold Quality" Council and it is our objective to achieve that in 2015."




A warm welcome to our members



Speedwatch

Eight Ash Green works with West Bergholt on this project. Many people, including myself, have been concerned about the number of speeding vehicles in the villages. So a few of us have been trained by Essex Police, and we go to approved sites, with a radar speed gun, and pass on details of speeding motorists we observe to the Police.

The radar gun works on the Doppler effect and is regularly checked for accuracy. Initially the Police just send a polite letter, with the details of the time and place and speed, asking the motorist to obey the speed limits in future.

It is not our or their aim to raise money, or to prosecute but to get all to obey the speed limits. We are all motorists ourselves and our aim is to make the roads safer for all to use.

We know that some motorists resent our doing this, and even some regular road users like taxi drivers have been offensive. They should realise that,



especially in an urban environment, keeping ones maximum speed within the speed limit, only adds very little to the total journey time. Being stuck in traffic because some other motorist has caused an incident adds significantly to many people's journey time.

Some will claim that speed does not cause accidents, and in a sense this is true - the earth is travelling around the Sun at nearly 70,000 mph, for example. However on the roads higher speeds give one less time to react to incidents, even to the errors of others! It is better to give a few seconds to allow for someone else's error, than to have a collision and to spend months sorting out the consequences. When we do our sessions, we have warning signs and have to wear High Visibility clothing. Many motorists do see this, and slow down accordingly, but some do not. If they are unable to see us, then they are unlikely to see other hazards, and really such people should not be on the roads. The braking distance increases with the square of the speed, which means that travelling at **double the speed**, **quadruples** one's **braking distance**. When the thinking distance is taken into account, the Highway Code gives total stopping distances of 75 ft (23 metres) at 30 mph; 96ft (29 m) at 35 mph; and 120 ft (36 m) at 40 mph. That extra 24 feet could make the difference between hitting another car or pedestrian, and avoiding them.

As readers will know, it is only possible to cross the railway line and the river, to the West of the town, either near North Station, Baker's Lane, or New Bridge, then Chitt's Hill or Spring Lane. Because Baker's Lane has been closed, and North Station is a notorious bottleneck, this has meant that a lot more traffic is using our villages, to get from say, Braiswick to the A12. Nothing wrong with this, of course, but they should obey the law. Argent's Lane is especially more busy. With a National speed limit of 60mph, few if any exceed this, but it is dangerous as in some places it is impossible for two cars to pass. There are regularly large farm vehicles, some with dangerous spikes on the front, and also some articulated HGVs. It is not illegal for them to use this route, but if they turn to go over the river bridge, then they are breaking the law, as there is a 7 tonne limit. Nevertheless it is extremely foolish to use this route, as if two were to meet it could be very difficult to resolve, as almost certainly a line of cars would quickly build up behind both vehicles.

When we do our sessions, pedestrians often complain to us about the excessive speed of some vehicles in both villages, many quoting 50 or even 60 mph. It is possible that some may be exaggerated, and it is not always easy to judge speeds. Most HGVs we see are within the limit, but they appear faster, and with narrow pavements (if any pavement at all) the turbulence they create can be intimidating to pedestrians.

Car key burglaries

In some cases burglars are breaking into houses while you sleep with the intention of finding your car keys and stealing your car and any other small items they find on the way, what can I do?

Firstly before you turn in for the night check that all doors, ground floor windows and easily accessible windows are closed **and** locked. PVCu doors – don't forget that the door is not fully locked until you have lifted the inside handle **and** turned the key. If you have an intruder alarm and can do so activate the downstairs zone. To stop the burglar getting to the vulnerable windows and doors to the rear ensure that side gates are closed and locked.

Please also ensure that you put your car keys somewhere safe and out of sight, when you return home. Put your car keys in a drawer (preferably one that is noisy to open) or some other secure place, but don't take them up to the bedroom with you.

If you have cars of different values, please park the higher value car in your garage. If you can't do this, please park the lower value car in front of the higher value car, as the thieves are more likely to target high value cars and will be deterred if they can't easily drive such a car away from the scene. With high value cars consider the fitting of a tracking system.

Doctors urge local people to use pharmacists more as 'yellow men' visit Colchester

Local people across north east Essex are being encouraged to make greater use of pharmacies for the treatment of minor illness, and to avoid using A&E except for life-threatening emergencies.

Doctors at the NHS North East Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) say that during the winter, hospital emergency departments and local GPs are under significant pressure with people coming in with coughs and colds. They add that a lot of that pressure could be relieved if people use pharmacies more.

Dr Hasan Chowhan from the CCG explained: "I would urge everyone to consider visiting their local pharmacist for advice or treatment for minor ailments such as coughs or colds.

"You may be seen faster and get the treatment you need at the pharmacy. In some other parts of Europe, pharmacies are very well used in this way and I believe if we all considered using our local pharmacists the NHS would work better for us as patients. In addition to pharmacists, there are other alternatives to A&E and we want people to use the most appropriate service available, including looking after yourself at home where possible, stocking up on appropriate medicines or if in doubt by calling NHS 111 for advice. Trained advisors there will assess your symptoms, and direct you to the most appropriate healthcare service.

A&E should only be for people with serious and life-threatening emergencies.
