One present you won't want this Christmas is a blockage in your pipes!

Turkeys for Christmas meals may be even more in demand this year than normal. It has been estimated on average we tuck into one million turkeys on this special day in our region alone.

As every turkey roughly produces three quarters of a pint of fat, this could mean 250 tonnes of it ending up in our sewer pipes if it is poured down the sink. This is the equivalent to two blue whales, 85 hippos or one million blocks of butter!

Instead, why not use the turkey fat to make a tasty roux, gravy or add to dumplings? It can be stored in the fridge in an air-tight container for up to three months, or in the freezer for up to a year. Build up of food waste, fats, oils and grease (FFOG), together with wipes and sanitary products which should never be flushed is the biggest cause of blockages. Anglian Water tackles around 40,000 a year, costing some £19million, and they can lead to nasty sewage spills and pollution.

If poured into the plug hole while it is warm, fat slides easily down the sink as a liquid, but then it quickly cools and hardens, coating pipes and restricting the flow of water and increasing the likelihood of a blockage.

Collette Parker, Community Engagement Manager for Anglian Water's Keep It Clear programme, said: "Our programme is working with communities to help prevent our pipes being blocked. One present they won't want at Christmas is a blockage in their pipes! Turkey fat can be re-used in cooking, and FFOG in general can help to condition soil with a special garden food digester, or combined composter such as the Green Johanna.

"Our technicians are out in all weathers every day fighting blockages in pipes and helping to prevent pollution of the environment. In fact, we have a blockage every 15 minutes in our arteries - the 77,000km of sewer pipes which take the used water from our toilets, bathrooms and kitchens, treat it, recycle it and put it back cleaned into our waterways."

Eighty per cent of blockages are avoidable through simple changes at home and at work by ensuring FFOG never goes down the plughole, and by only ever flushing the 3Ps, poo, pee and paper (toilet paper). Only wipes with the Fine to Flush logo can be flushed because they break down quickly like toilet paper and do not contain hidden micro plastics which are harmful to the environment.

Remember, recycle or bin your turkey fat to help keep your pipes clear this Christmas.

1st West Bergholt and 3rd West Bergholt Brownies

We have been continuing our Brownie meetings via zoom and the girls spent the first half term working on their 'Skills for the Future' theme badge.

Firstly, the girls joined in a shopping game, making money and then using this to buy goods and work out change needed. Then we dressed up as an occupation and talked about what we wanted to be when we grow up, then we talked about different foods, where they come from and how we cook them. The girls were encouraged to donate some food to the Food Bank as we talked about Harvest Festival. The girls then had a cooking evening making pizzas – they thoroughly enjoyed this. We then moved onto tools, talking about safety and how we use them. For our last meeting, the girls made themselves a car; there were lots of designs from cardboard boxes to furniture. We then followed a route on google maps looking out for hazards and talking about road safety.

During half term the girls decorated pebbles with Poppies to join in the Remembrance activity with St Mary's Church. They also decorated pumpkins to display in their windows, supporting the Moulsham District Guiding pumpkin Spotting Challenge - for this they all received a fun Halloween badge.

The second half term was full of fun activities including Remembrance day activities, another cooking night and some Christmas crafts. At the end of term, we held a chocolate bingo evening to help raise much needed funds for the unit. We are hoping to return to our face to face meetings in the new year when we can welcome some new girls to our units.

Our Village Halls in 2020

If I had been asked to pen an article for the Village Bulletin this time last year about the Halls, what a different article that would have been to this!

COVID has given the Hall Trustees, and Laura and Vicky, some interesting times this year, and indeed just as a degree of semblance returned along comes "lockdown 2". Writing this on 31st October, who knows where we'll be when you read this!

Before COVID hit us though earlier this year, the roof was retiled with funding help from Enover, not without one or two issues but successfully completed by M & J under supervision by Ingleton Wood. This was one of the largest projects to have been undertaken since the John Lampon Hall was built.

Like all of us, the Trustees have had to pull in their horns on behalf of the Halls and we have drawn up 'worst worst case' and 'best worst case' budgets to stand alongside those set a year ago after a large number of Hall users met on Zoom at the end of July to discuss reopening the Halls in September.

All but essential work to the Halls' fabric has been put on hold for this year now but you will have seen completion of the CCTV installation, with funding help from CBC's Safer Rural Communities Fund, and tenders are currently being sought to redecorate the John Lampon Hall, but you will not see a lick of new paint until grant monies are obtained. One thing you also will not have seen is the 5-year fixed wire testing survey carried out.

Zoe, our cleaner, has been great and helped us out with her flexible hours as we have chopped and changed such to fit in between hirers.

Those of you that have hired the Halls, and unfortunately we have not been able to hire to many of you, will have seen the signage around the Halls, the hand sanitisers we have put in, the paper towel dispensers, etc. all following our COVID risk assessment and our special hire conditions.

Before I forget, what I must do is thank those regular hirers who have continued to pay to keep their 'slots' open for next year, and to help the Hall finances, thank you.

As we continue through this difficult period though we have begun to plan for 2021/2022 and what we want to do to the Halls. It is too early let the cat out of the bag for what we would like to do, but you will see next year, if Boris and this COVID 'problem' let us.

Finally, a big thanks go to Vicky and Laura for everything they do ensure West Bergholt has one of the best run Halls in Essex.

P.S. please note and regard the new signs on the brick piers as you enter and exit the car park through the right gates, keep to 5 mph and don't let the dogs out once you have parked, dogs are not allowed on the Lorkin Daniel field.

One of the big bonuses to coming to the training sessions is that each year, if we have enough interest, we look to progress one or two teams to the Under 7 leagues of the Colchester & District Youth League. At present we have 2 Under 7 teams and a further 7 teams at different age groups through to Under 16.

It has been a challenge this year, with COVID and other demands, but the season got underway in September and all of our teams were enjoying playing football on a weekly basis on the Poors Field, until 5th November, when amateursport was suspended. We have complied with all of the COVID regulations and have Track and Trace for parents and other spectators. These are placed on Respect barriers next to the pitches. Please ensure you scan the QR code when attending. Many thanks to Gareth and Karen for setting this up. Obviously our priority has been providing a safe environment especially as we have to juggle different pitch sizes.

A census has taken place in England every ten years since 1801 (with the exception of 1941). A census gathers information about our society so that appropriate services can be put in place for everyone to enjoy now and in the future.

Did you know that water companies use census data to anticipate peak water demand? Or that the NHS uses census data to plan a wide range of services such as hospitals and GP surgeries, mobile chiropodists and home support? Everything from schools to care home places are planned using census data to make sure that the needs of all age groups are met.

Every aspect of our lives is impacted by the census, so it is vital that everyone participates to ensure the best possible understanding of the structure and needs of our society.

By taking part, you can make sure that your community is represented and gets its share of public and other funding to ensure the provision of services now and in the future.

The next census official census date is Sunday 21st March 2021, but Census 2021 will be the first time that everyone will be able to complete the census online at any time from the beginning of March 2021.

You will receive a letter with your unique access code and will be able to complete the census online using any device.

Help will be available if you need it by phone, email or text. You will also be able to use web-chat or social media, or drop into a Covid-compliant Census Support Centre. Guidance will be available in a range of languages and accessible formats, and the paper option will still be available if needed.

The census is run by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) which operates completely independently of government and of any private sector interests.

All information submitted for the census is stored securely and anonymised. No personal data is ever sold nor is it shared with any other government department.

Information from the census is only released after 100 years when your descendants may be tracing their own family history.

Please make sure that you support your community by participating in Census 2021.
