For many years the Rural Community Council for Essex (RCCE) has organised a Best Kept Village competition, sponsored by Calor. Earlier in the year Chris Stevenson and I volunteered(?) to submit an entry on behalf of the village. This was under six headings, and although at first it seemed a daunting task we soon realised that our village has many attributes, Hillhouse Wood and the Care Network are good examples, which fitted well the criteria. Also the outcomes of the village survey for the Parish Plan gave us useful information and helped identify the multitude of clubs and organisations that exist in the village. We are grateful to the many residents that we contacted who helped to supplement this information.

In June we realised we had reached the final round when we were asked to provide a team from a cross section of the village to meet a panel of judges. I am grateful to Richard Chadborn, John Gili-Ross, Jackie Leech, Susan Leng, Joyce Lucking and Chris Stevenson who took on this task and faced a barrage of questions about the village for about an hour.

Their efforts were not in vain as in mid July we were invited to a presentation evening at Chelmsford attended by the great and the good of the County. We learnt that from about seventy-five entries in five categories according to size (ours is the 2500 to 5000 population group) we had been awarded a Merit. We were beaten by Theydon Bois and Coggeshall.

Thanks to all who contributed and now the aim is to learn from the experience and make the top two next year.

West Bergholt -First Responder Group (FRG)

VOLUNTEERS REQUIRED

The village FRG continues to develop and expand since it was formed in March this year, but more needs to be done for the group to become truly effective in the long term.

A very successful meeting in July introduced three potential members to the group, who when trained, will enable the FRG to increase its cover time in West Bergholt to over 50% of the week. Since May the group has responded to a further three callouts bringing the total since March to six. However the callout rates could be increased if more of the rota could be filled by recruitment. It seems that some volunteers have not felt able to come forward as they are concerned about being tied down to set times on the rota. This need not be the case, as the rota can be easily adjusted to suit individual circumstances.

John Hopkins of the Essex Ambulance Service attended the July meeting and gave a very interesting training lecture on Defibrillation and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). He very kindly lent the equipment to the group for a month to enable them to practice. All existing members of West Bergholt FRG are being re-examined on CPR in August, as six monthly updates are a compulsory requirement.

An appeal for donations met with a very generous response and £300 was raised, which will be used to purchase training equipment. Further donations can be sent to Annie Neish, FRG Co-ordinator, at 50 New Church Road, West Bergholt, tel no. 240469.

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West Bergholt Parish Counc

Mrs Jenny Church was co-opted to the Parish Council at the July meeting of the Parish Council. She will sit on the Environment Committee.

Matters Arising - There was a discussion about adopting Paragraph 12(2) of the Code of Conduct, which is not mandatory.

To Discuss Proposed New Format of Future Meetings. Following a course attended by Mr Stone, he suggested the Parish Council could consider a new format for future meetings, to encourage particiption of members of the public. Examples of possible agendas and a report had been previously circulated. A working party consisting of Mr Stone, Mrs Church and Mrs Walsom was formed. A progress report will be made at the meeting in September.

ENVIRONMENT REPORT - Letters will be sent to residents at houses with overgrown hedges.

Mr Johnson will explore the possibility of a village sign on the Newbridge Hill approach to the village and follow up on clearing the bridge area.

It was agreed to accept a quote of £400 to cut back the Willow tree by the Queen's Head Pond following the fall of a large branch.

Mr Johnson is communicating with Mary Moir, Footpaths officer for CBC about the condition and line of the footpath at Newbridge Mill, following a complaint from a resident. CBC is taking action and a reference number, 23707 has been allocated.

It was agreed that Mrs Fosker could proceed with installing a dog bin in Hall Road. There will be a cost to the Parish Council for its installation and an ongoing cost for emptying. West Bergholt was awarded a Merit in the RCCE Best Kept Village Competition. Mr Gili-Ross thanked Mr Stone, his team and Graham Broom for their hard work.

Allotments - It was agreed, following an attack of blight on potato and tomato crops, that a 'one off burn' could take place as these crops cannot be composted. This will be carried out at a suitable time and will be carefully monitored. Mr Broom will trim hedges where necessary. Mr Johnson will confirm dates with Mr King for the village hedge cutting.

Poors Land - Atkins is to be contacted to check on the progress of the remedial work to the entrance.

A meeting is to be arranged between Pinnacle and the trustees to discuss grass cutting issues.

Lorkin Daniell Playing Field - Mr Savage agreed to arrange the repair of a large pothole on the car park.

Mr Short will look into making safe an electrical box by the MUGA. It is not clear whose responsibility the box is.

It was agreed to approve the revised plans for the new football club house. It was made clear that any buildings on trust land become the responsibility of the trustees and there may be no major changes to the Licence.

Following confirmation of the grant from the East Essex Area Forum bringing the total funding available to £16590, it was agreed to order the Mountain Climber at a cost of £14900 Village Green - A new lock is to be purchased to replace one missing from a rhino post outside the Scout Hut.

HALL REPORT - Mr Gili-Ross was confirmed as Chair of the Hall Committee. Meetings will be held on 2nd Thursday of the month at 7.30p.m. in the Ernest Blackwell room.

Mrs Mayhew will take on additional duties to deal with day to day matters affecting the Hall and report to Mr Gili-Ross or Mrs Walsom.

Mrs Mayhew is dealing with a smell in the kitchen and has arranged for Senroc to deal with pressure problems on the new boilers.

CCTV – The system is still not working properly and payment of the last bill of over \pounds 5000 is still being withheld. Mr Sleigh is dealing with this.

Lighting system – Mr Savage has met with a lighting designer to produce a specification required for the hall. Mr Short will arrange quotes.

Ceiling insulation – Mr Gili-Ross will take on the responsibility for this work.

Redecoration – Mr Sleigh will organise redecoration of the hall once the lighting and insulation work has been completed.

Flooring – This will be the last area to be completed. Responsibility for this work will be arranged at a later date. Mr Short will arrange for necessary remedial work to be looked at by Bob Hollock.

Hall fabric – internal and external – Mrs Mayhew will be responsible for regularly inspecting the hall both inside and out as well as the car park area. She is to produce a list of items requiring attention. It is hoped that Mr Broom will be able to take on some of this work. Work relating to the car park will be passed to the Environment committee.

Mrs Mayhew is to ask Bluebell Pre-School not to put tables in front of fire doors.

Storage – Mr Colbron will look at possible improvements to the storage facilities.

Mrs Mayhew will look at ways of improving the office, particularly as this area is open to the public. She will also sort out and label all the keys currently held in the office. Mrs Walsom and Mr Gili-Ross should each hold a set.

Mr Stevenson will be responsible for carrying out a survey of the kitchen over the summer to determine short, medium and long term needs. Mrs Mayhew will be responsible for checking on the cleaners' work. This will be compared with their contract.

Mr Colbron will look into the possibility of having a lockable notice board in the hall as the current board is used by all and is in a mess.

Much of the work to be undertaken is reliant upon the success of grants for funding which Mr Savage has applied for. Mr Sleigh will look at problems with the loop system following a letter received from the Orpen Players. The Hall committee will look into the possibility of gaining a RCCE Hallmark. An entry form had been received for the Augustine

Parish Plan Update

Before anyone asks, yes, we have finally finished the analysis of the various village questionnaires! It took a little longer than anticipated as we rely on only a few volunteers and due to the amount of detail you gave us to analyse - thank you for this fantastic support!

Many of you will have seen some of the initial results at the June Village Fayre, but as a reminder over the course of the past 12 months the following surveys have been carried out:

- Household questionnaire distributed via the Bulletin
- Survey of secondary school children at popular schools
- Survey of village organizations
- Survey of village businesses

Prior to these surveys there have also been a number of drop-in events

- Village Fayre stall
- Heathlands School event
- Initial drop-in event at John Lampon Hall

Altogether nearly 300 survey forms were returned from all the questionnaires. These have been examined, coded, entered on databases, analysed and short reports on each produced. At the time of writing these summaries are being submitted for inclusion on the village web site so check out www.westbergholt.net for further details.

The initial results of the surveys make interesting reading:

Household surveys (1500 households consulted) reveal that over 50% had lived in the village for over 15 years, over half support at least one village club/society, hugely value village life and the countryside setting, support local shops, consider local facilities good and generally feel safe in the village BUT have issues with overdevelopment, anti-social behaviour and consider transport matters need addressing. Issues to do with speeding on the main roads, parking around



the Co-op and the lack of facilities for pedestrians and cyclists are just a few of the items raised.

Businesses (60 businesses consulted) consider that being close to the A12, rail line and town make our village a good base, however this is let down by poor broadband, parking issues and planning restrictions.

Young People (eight schools surveyed) think that the village is a good place to live but that the bus service needs improving and that there is a lack of facilities including a youth club, meeting place

and sports facilities such as basketball and table tennis.

Village Organisations (47 consulted) consider that the variety of clubs and societies is good and that crime levels are low. However access to hospitals and large supermarkets is poor, parking around the Co-op needs addressing and facilities for young adults need consideration.

These results are vital in understanding priorities for the village, and because all plans have to be (in the planning jargon) "evidence-based". Currently, a detailed draft plan is being worked on covering the different questionnaire headings of **Community; Environment; Public Amenities; Shops and Facilities; Housing/Planning; Community safety; Transport and Council Services.**

Overall we have been really pleased with the positive and helpful responses received. Our stall at the Village Fayre was very well attended and the balloons, with their "old fashioned" styling proved collectors items towards the end of the afternoon!

NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION PANELS (NAPS)

At the end of last year, NAPs were set up with the object of getting interested parties to raise any problems affecting the quality of life in local villages and, to discuss with the Panels how these problems could best be addressed.

Your correspondent attended one such meeting at Dedham in July where the principal subjects up for discussion affecting the village were intimidating gatherings of teenagers at the Co-op and around the War Memorial and the fear of many of the elderly to go out after dark. All these difficulties we have been experiencing to some extent in West Bergholt and it is to deal with these sort of problems that the NAPs have been set up. It is, therefore, important that pressure is applied to these panels to insure that the "action" element of their title is translated into "action".

SUSPICIOUS TELEPHONE CALLS

At the end of July, a resident of the village received a telephone call claiming to be a Government message, which indicated that, if you had debts of over £15k, there was interest free help available - all you had to do was press 1 on your telephone for more information. This call was bogus and was, in fact, part of a much larger scam. If you think you have received such a call please inform the Police (see telephone number below).

UNSOCIAL PARKING

There has been a marked increase in the habit of cars being parked half-on and half-off the pavement in many parts of the village. Though the intention of the driver may be to keep the road clear for other traffic users it is, nevertheless, illegal for cars to be parked in this fashion. It can be a real inconvenience to users of the pavements, particularly mothers with prams and the elderly.

STRAYING DOGS - Asbo

The Borough Council Dog Wardens can now apply for a 'Petasbo' (what next!) on animals that regularly roam at large, unchecked by their owners. For more infomation contact the Wardens on 01206 282222.

CRIME UPDATE

The incidents of crime in the village have, in recent months, remained a little below average and for this encouraging development we must thank our Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) who has been targeting likely trouble spots in the village. Despite his efforts, though, we still seem to get our fair share of petty crimes and anti-social behaviour.

It is an interesting statistic that five bicycles are stolen every minute in the UK. One such incident occurred in Lexden Road when a green cycle was stolen.

Bogus callers, claiming to be Anglian Water engineers have appeared in the area again. They nearly always operate in pairs and target single occupancy properties. Be careful not to allow strangers into your house unless you are aware of their bona fides.

Vehicle damage has occurred in Albany Road and New Church Road.

All these incidents are fairly low key, except to the victims, so please report crime or anti social behaviour to the Police initially, and then your NW representative.

Friends of Hillhouse Wood



Freak weather makes work for volunteers

In a year so far dominated by what can only be described as freakish weather, the appearance and condition of the wood bears its mark. Vegetational growth has burgeoned to such an extent that in some areas it has towered above head height. David Bull and his team of management volunteers have had to undertake some out of season work to ensure users of paths can still enjoy their walks. Also the volunteers have had to deal with some fallen trees and branches caused by the often gale force winds which have accompanied frequent rainstorms. The main management work parties will resume in September.

April began the strange weather pattern with days of sunshine and high temperatures and what amounted to drought conditions and this brought on early wild flower blossoms. On April 14, Philip Smith and I led the traditional Hillhouse Spring Nature Walk, attended by a welcome 28. It was fine and warm, temperature 24 degrees Centigrade. Bluebells were already coming into bloom, plus lots of wood anemones, lady's smock (cuckoo flower), moschatel and some wild garlic (ransomes) showing white bloom. Several chiff-chaffs (fresh back from Africa) were singing as were blackcaps. Butterflies seen were brimstone, Greenveined white, comma, speckled wood, peacock and red admiral.

But by May 13, when the popular dawn chorus birdsong fixture was due at 3.45am, the impact of changing weather had a dire effect. Obviously the previous day's rainstorms and cool wind put off the punters, so only one brave person joined Philip Smith and me at the Old Church. However the rain held off and the nightingales and blackcaps were singing among the many other bird choristers.

Before the Dawn Chorus, the Bluebell and Wild Flower afternoon on April 28 attracted scores of people and the bluebells and other spring flowers were magnificent. In the sunshine, lots of butterflies were flying. The Friends' display of photos at the Old Church proved a big attraction and ten new members for the Friends resulted.

The Moths and Bats evening of June 22 was a success and attended by a group of West Bergholt Scouts. The moth lamp was lit by Ian Rose, of Essex Moth Group, and myself at 10.pm, powered by our portable generator. Thirty species were recorded between 10pm and midnight, including a privet hawk moth as well as a large worker hornet that was boxed for the group to admire at a safe range. Darren Tansley, Colchester Natural History Society's mammals recorder, operated his bat detector, which identifies species from their high frequency calls, and two species were registered.

One of the most exciting natural history discoveries this summer is the identification of a rare damselfly, the

beautiful demoiselle. In 2006, a West Bergholt resident and naturalist, Nigel Rayner, reported he had found this species near Hillhouse Wood. Previously the only other Essex locality so far known was the Roman River valley at Friday Wood. Phil Smith investigated the report in June and discovered both the male and female demoiselles along the stream bordering Hillhouse Wood, adding a very special record to the Wood's growing wildlife community.
