

Community Policing in West Bergholt

There is a perception amongst some residents that village policing has deteriorated for many villages in the Borough. The reality should be somewhat different as there are now many more Police Officers serving our communities than there were ten years ago.

What has changed is the way in which our Police Officers address community needs. The days of the village "Bobby" have gone and are unlikely to return. In their place we now have "Neighbourhood Policing" which is a larger but shared resource pool operating across groups of villages. For West Bergholt this consists of a team of Police Officers - a Police Sergeant, a Neighbourhood Specialist Officer (NSO) and a Police Community Support Officer (PCSO). In addition, up to three other Police Officers can be called upon if necessary, to deal with specific local policing needs. This team provides a near 24 hour service from 8am to 4am and is just one of the community teams based out of the Copford police station. In addition to this Neighbourhood Support Team (NST) emergency call out and traffic teams are enabled for village issues where appropriate.

Neighbourhood Support Team

The NST interfaces with the community either directly with residents, via our Neighbourhood Watch team or through the Neighbourhood Action Panel (see below). To be successful the NST has to work with the communities it is there to support and relies on feedback of issues that are causing concern. Neighbourhood Watch are the eyes and ears of community policing and are most effective when issues are developing in our village i.e. antisocial behaviour, suspicious activity or just awareness when security alarms are activated. An occurrence of such incidents can be recorded by an effective NW team and reported to the police for them to take appropriate action. For many years West Bergholt has been home to one of the most efficient Neighbourhood Watch teams in the Borough. To continue this success our village desperately needs a volunteer to replace John Ford and take over the

co-ordination of the village team to act as a local interface to the NST. Neighbourhood Action Panel

The Neighbourhood Action Panel (NAP) is a government led initiative. The panel is made up of non-police volunteers who live within the communities served by the NAP. NAP's have been established to record and co-ordinate community issues that require resolution by the Police, Colchester Borough Council, Essex County Council, Parish Councils or a combination of these authorities. NAP meetings give residents the opportunity to formally register issues or concerns and the NAP will agree community priorities and decide on a realistic and achievable course of action. West Bergholt is part of the "Constable NAP" which includes the villages to the north of Colchester from Wormingford in the west to Dedham in the east. NAP meetings are held regularly in one of the villages that form part of the Constable area. West Bergholt Neighbourhood Watch



Update

A meeting was convened in the Orpen Hall between WBNW, PS Mike Lee of the Community Police Team and the Chairman of the Parish Council to understand how effective community policing will operate in the village. It was made clear that Ward policing as proposed by Essex senior police officer back in 2007 was impractical. The expectation at the time was that West Bergholt and Eight Ash Green would form a "Ward" and have a designated Police Officer, PCSO and a special constable being assigned for the two villages.

However, due to lack of resources and other operational issues, PS Lee explained that it is simply not practical to implement Ward Policing for West Bergholt as originally proposed. The Policing arrangements which have now been put in place are described in the article on Community Policing on the front page of this edition.

It was agreed at the meeting that, while the new arrangements fall well short of the original proposals, WBNW broadly accepted they will have to work within the new guidelines. The most pressing need now is for a WBNW Area Co-ordinator to be appointed as soon as possible.

Recent Village Crimes

The Co-op was raided in December and some money stolen. WBNW has not been informed if any arrests have been made or if the money has been recovered.

A suspicious person was seen in Chapel Road on January 7th and the Police were informed. A suspicious person was heard during that night - January 7th/8th - in Albany Road, but left quickly when a dog started barking. The two incidents may be connected.

In January a male was arrested in Earle Harvard Road for possession of an offensive weapon. An attempt was made to steal a cement mixer in Chapel Road and investigations are on going as at the end of January.

SECOND LETTER FROM AUSTRALIA

I have faint memories of the war years. My brothers used to collect shrapnel from the bombs left over from the attacks on London and dropped near us. They had a lot, some of them big pieces. We used to hide under our dining table when the siren went off. I'm not sure what good it would have been in a direct hit, but luckily we never had to find out! We were issued with gas masks - mine was Micky

Mouse - and we had to carry them everywhere. They smelt dreadfully of rubber, but you could make very interesting noises if you blew into them! At the back of the school were air-raid shelters, dark caves that the children were herded into when the siren sounded. After the war, Fredina Fisher and I used to creep into them, scare ourselves witless in the dark, and rush out again. Freddy's parents were the school caretakers, and lived in the house attached to the school.

The Americans had a base near Bergholt and they'd put on parties for the village children, taking us to the base where we were fed all sorts of food on ration to us, but plentiful for the Americans. I remember at one party I lost my coat, a great disaster then, but I can't remember now if I ever found it! The American convoys would drive past and we would shout out "got any gum chum?" and they'd throw us packets of chewing gum.

The farms had prisoners of war working on them - German and Italian - and we got to know them. We'd wave and have a chat although we weren't supposed to. I believe several of the prisoners stayed on in England after the war.

When we got to our teens we used to have dances in the Orpen Hall, often with a real band! Young people came from the surrounding villages and that was how we got to know each other. There were a lot of inter-village romances! Often we'd go into Colchester to dances. There were no late buses so we'd book Mr. Isom's taxi and share the cost. Mr. Isom was a lovely man, and if you got stuck in Colchester having missed the last bus, he'd let you pay later if you hadn't got enough money. On Coronation day we had a bonfire in the school grounds, a big dance in the Orpen Hall and Coronation Ale - supplied free if I remember correctly. I wasn't old enough to have any but I must admit that I did anyway!

We had a table-tennis club in the scouts hall, and tennis courts along New Church Road. We'd spend most of the summer holidays playing tennis, and were expected to wear proper white clothes. Mrs. Churchman would tell us off if we didn't!

The rector then was Rev. Douglas and he had a creamcoloured pug dog which he carried everywhere with him, even on his bike.

We had a lot of fun back then - making most of it ourselves! We didn't get into too much trouble, and if we did we'd collect a clip round the ear from the village bobby who lived up the Lexden road in the police house. He'd get sued now! Just a bit about me. Brocklehurst is a little village ten minutes from Dubbo - population thirty-nine thousand plus. We are in a mostly agricultural area, growing lucerne, wheat etc.

Lots of sheep and cattle. Horses everywhere - we have three. I'm coach for Riding for the Disabled, which you also have in the U.K. and I write a bit, short stories etc, some published in anthologies. Our weather is hot in Summer - today we had 31C and getting warmer - but we have frost in winter. Our gardens have the same plants as yours but with a fair few hotter climate species thrown in. We have around an acre of garden.

I hope we can keep the West Bergholt/Brocklehurst link going every so often. Hoping West Bergholt has a super Christmas. Isabel Wallace

Friends of Hillhouse Wood



More essential management work has been carried out by the work parties

including clearances of scrub, bramble growth and the surrounds of both ponds. There will be a major removal of reed mace and other growth from the top pond and also the dredging of silt build-up. Care has to be taken in this operation because of the presence of a number of dragonfly and damselfly species and also of great-crested newts, which are a scheduled 'red data' species given special protection. More attention is being paid to removal of dead growth on elms affected by disease and some coppicing in order to try and protect the colony of the uncommon butterfly species, the white-letter hairstreak, the caterpillars of which feed on elm leaves.

The wood now has increased status for wildlife following the discovery of a colony of a rare damselfly; the beautiful demoiselle in the stream on the Fordham edge of the wood and permission has been obtained for careful clearance of overgrown sections with advice from a dragonfly expert. There is continued evidence of badger activity in the wood and there have been sightings of otters along the Fordhamside of the stream. Small parties of roe deer are regularly seen in fields bordering the wood and muntjac deer are seen commonly in the wood itself. Because of this some protection is being given to wild flowers especially the early-purple orchid colonies.

The annual fungus foray led by local expert Ian Rose in October resulted in the discovery of more than 60 species including some rare or uncommon. Thanks to the excellent poster distribution by Chris Stevenson sixteen attended. During the fungus searches Philip Smith saw (and heard) a nuthatch and this is the first record of this uncommon woodland bird for the wood in recent years. The winter bird walk on January 11th led by myself and Philip Smith was attended by fifteen people. There was a good mix of species seen including three little egrets; a grey heron; kestrel; snipe; goldcrest; green and great spotted woodpeckers and twelve siskins feeding on alder seed cones.

There will be a memorial to Peter Johnson who was for several years chairman of the Friends and a tireless worker for the conservation of the wood and its wildlife. It is expected this is likely to be a dedicated tree.

DIARY OF A FIRST RESPONDER

The equipment was delivered to me by the responder who had chosen the night shift. Before switching on the dedicated mobile phone I checked the equipment before placing it in the car. I then put the folder, containing official forms and street maps, by the front door with car keys, disposable gloves and fluorescent coat with id. badge attached.

I switched on the phone by 9a.m. and called ambulance control to tell them I was ready to respond. I would estimate that preparation time was no more than 10 minutes.

During the morning I read the paper and then cleared all the ironing which is saved up for responding days. A friend called around for a coffee. In the afternoon I went across to my allotment (directly opposite my house) to get some vegetables for dinner. I do enjoy gardening, which I can still do whilst on call, but I cannot do any sort which involves getting covered in mud in case a call comes. We aim to be on route within two minutes of receiving the call so there is no time to change clothes or footwear.

At 3p.m. I needed to go to the station to collect my son so I put the phone off for the 15 minutes needed for the journey. We are told by the ambulance service that they do not want us to be inconvenienced by being on call so if we find we need to go out during our session we will not be reproached for doing so.

At 5p.m I called the next person on duty and delivered the equipment to them. If there is no one listed on the rota to follow on immediately we have a list of reserves that can be called to see if they are available but they are not obliged to go on call. It is very satisfying to be on call and to complete all the household tasks at the same time!



WHAT TYPE OF CALLS WILL YOU ATTEND?

The type of calls you will be asked to attend are life threatening emergencies such as heart attacks, chest pain, cardiac arrest, fits and breathing problems.


SO HOW DO I FIT

When a person calls 999 you are notified of the emergency by ambulance control via a dedicated mobile phone. As you live or work in the West Bergholt area you should arrive before the ambulance and be able to assist the patient.

Once the crew arrive you are then able to return to your normal daily routine.

The few minutes you have spent with the patient could help save a life.

The more responders there are the better the cover in the village. Being a Responder should not change your lifestyle but it will give you new skills and the opportunity to make a difference in West Bergholt.



One entrepreneur, two retired nurses, two police officers, two community carers, one retired head teacher, one surveyor, one bid manager, a printing engineer and a trampoline coach!

So, as you can see, our volunteers come from a wide cross section of backgrounds and not all have previous medical experience. Full training is given to all members and regular support.

Two's Company - Responding in a pair

Being a First Responder doesn't mean working alone. In the village we have two couples who respond as a pair, therefore sharing the responsibility of being 'on call'. Nick and Eileen Blayney and Phil and Sue Valby have been Responders since March 2007 when the group formed. They chose to respond as a pair as they felt more comfortable working together rather than alone. "When working in a pair you can help each other out and divide up the jobs" commented Phil. "For example, should Sue and I get called, then I will drive whilst Sue navigates and when we arrive, should we need to give Oxygen or use the defibrillator hen Sue and I have particular tasks we each carry out. Working together is a great way of Responding as we can help each other remember what to do and back each other up. We also tend to be on call overnight to fit in with my job in London so being in a pair when called out at night gives us peace of mind".

Our link with the East of England Ambulance Service is Dan Firmin (paramedic) who comes to our monthly meetings. He gives his time on a voluntary basis and conducts the re-testing sessions, when due, for each member every six months. In addition Dan welcomes any member of the group to voluntarily join him or other members of the service for an observation shift in the ambulance or in the rapid response vehicle.

These shifts can be extremely enlightening and help members of the group to learn more than they have been taught at their initial training session. Team members are part of the East of England Ambulance Service albeit as volunteers.

Joining a shift with the ambulance service in Essex has also been extended to one of our group who was welcomed aboard with the Queensland Ambulance Service in Australia. If you become a First Responder with the West Bergholt group you too could experience a special experience abroad!

A Community Bus for West Bergholt?

Following a consideration of transport issues raised in the Parish Plan the Parish Council is investigating the possibility of some provision by a Community Bus for the village similar, but on a lesser scale, to those at Coggeshall and Manningtree. This could take the form of a minibus with up to sixteen seats provided by Essex County Council from their fleet based in Colchester, mainly for evening and weekend use. The plan would be to operate under Section 19 of the Transport Act and so would need a team of volunteer drivers. The cost of hiring this vehicle would be £1 a mile. Arrangements would need to be made to cover this cost.

Three potential areas of demand have been identified:

- * To provide a daily service from North Station to the village for regular commuters returning after 7.00pm
- * To provide at least a once weekly service (between 11.00am and 2.00pm) to an out of town shopping area (possibly Tollgate)
- * To be available for one off trips for clubs, societies, BYG, Scouts, the school for example.

My family name is Pettican and from about 1800 to the 1920's we had direct ancestors living in West Bergholt, more specifically in what was then called Church Lane where my great grandparents William and Sarah Pettican lived. They had ten children - William. George, Eva, Ada, Frank, Harriett, Elsie, Minnie, Daisy and Ernest.

Having emailed Old St. Mary's Church I received a reply letting me know that Church Lane was where Hall Road meets at a crossroads. Church Lane is sometimes referred to now as Old Church Lane. Having finally had the chance to make a brief visit to West Bergholt last weekend we went to this spot which now has two relatively modern houses in it leading into the fields.

I was wondering if you had any information about what was Church Lane or any copies of old photos of the area? I have visited the West Bergholt website and been very interested in the historic images displayed there.

By way of additional information, our research has thrown up the possibility that some of our Pettican's worked for a time at High Trees Farm just down the road from Church Lane, Elsie Pettican worked at the Old Rectory as a domestic servant.

This new issue updates the first release of the plan with the inclusion of over 20 photographs of the village, some maps and a preface explaining how the plan was produced. Bulletin readers will know that the first issue was adopted by the Parish Council as forming the forward plan for the community in September of 2008.



The plan, which has been sent to the Rural Community Council of Essex (RCCE) Essex and Colchester Councils, will be used to help define in

planning terms, what the village as a third sector (in the planning jargon) wants to see achieved, and lists aspirations for a whole range of community facilities and services.

As a first stage in monitoring the plan's progress, a workshop was held in the John Lampon Hall at the end of November.
